



The competition was really tough, but all the promised glory and bragging rights goes to Akron.

Other notable accomplishments:

- There was a truly marvelous collection of sixteen entries from six clubs! Thank you, thank you, thank you to each and every one of you wonderful, generous bakers!
- Five entries tied for the top taste rating of 9 out of 10: Charlene Klinger's Spicy Pumpkin Cookies and Cranberry Orange Walnut Shortbread Cookies, Wary Pearce's Lemon Butter Cookies, Dorathea Fugua's Texas Sheet Cake Cookies, and Al Gwyn's Best Ever Chocolate Chip Cookies. Four others received an "8," so clearly our judges had an enviable job!
- Dorathea's Italian Peach Cookies, perfect representations of little fresh-picked peaches, got the highest silent auction bid at \$40! Patti Gwyn's winning Ooey Goey Lemon Cookies came in second.
